

### **Build Love Projects (Building Houses!)**

#### 16' x 20' 3-Room Home with Loft for \$10,000

In just one weekend, your mission team can construct a 16' x 20' weatherproof home that is built to last and offers families shelter for many years to come. Regardless of your skills, gender, or age, there's a role for everyone to contribute!

- Baja Christian Ministries (BCM) provides a concrete foundation and construction materials
  - All lumber is pre-cut and marked for ease of construction
  - Home Exteriors feature: an asphalt shingles roof, siding with trim, paint, four windows, metal security door, and locks
  - O Home Interiors include drywall, mud, electrical outlets & switches, light fixtures, and paint
- Add-Ons
  - o Furniture Package, \$2,000
    - Bunk bed and mattress, full bed and mattress, stove kit, kitchen table and chairs
  - 4' x 4' latrine, \$2,000
    - Most developing communities don't have sewer systems, and a latrine is a necessary
  - o Full house insulation, \$1200
  - o Ceiling drywall with ceiling fan, \$300
  - o Interior finish- BCM will sand and paint the interior, \$500
  - o Refrigerator, \$450
- Special building projects such as church buildings, classrooms, and playgrounds are possible.
   (contact office to discuss specific projects)

### Acts 20:30 Evangelism (\$300 per outreach)

- BCM and the mission teams conduct door-to-door invitations for community members to attend a
  gathering to receive the "good news." Attendees are offered complimentary copies of both the Bible
  and the Purple Book. What is the purple book? https://youtu.be/gSNBoamm9CA
- Once the group has assembled, we prompt missionary team participants to share a "two-minute miracle" or personal testimony illustrating the impact of Jesus on their lives. Following this, the Gospel is shared, and we extend an invitation to receive prayer.
- After outreach, BCM works with local pastors and leaders who follow up with community members.
- Every year, we distribute numerous Bibles and Purple Books through Acts 20:20 evangelism, sparking the establishment of many church plants.
- Add-Ons
  - Project Open Storehouse, \$30 per food kit, a minimum of 10 kits @ \$300
    - During the lockdowns of 2020, we initiated an urgent food assistance initiative to support needy families. This initiative has since been maintained, providing essential supplies to numerous families near our housing projects. This approach effectively cultivates community involvement and promotes the gospel's message. We work closely with the families we aid, coordinating gatherings and utilizing the backing of local church leaders for outreach activities.
  - Fiesta / Clown Show and BMX Show with Hot Dogs, Tamales, or Tacos for 150 people (vary)
  - Special Outreach, Liaison, or help fund another BCM Program (vary)

### What to Bring to Mexico

Cash (preferably in small US dollar denominations - exchanging into pesos is not necessary)
Sunscreen, lip balm, and any necessary personal medications
If staying at a bunkhouse

# **Distributing Items in the Communities**

Kindly notify Baja Christian Ministries of any additional items your team wishes to distribute. Please be aware that used items such as toys and clothes may pose border crossing issues and are not allowed. If the items are permissible, we can then proceed with the appropriate importation procedures. The importation cost for items is typically 16% of their value. However, there may be instances where we can reduce costs if they are received as donations in Mexico. Please consult with us beforehand to discuss this possibility.

### **Clearing Mexican Customs**

Mexico technically requires a minimum 7-day tourist visa or longer to enter the border. But to those who have driven across recently have experienced that Mexico customs rarely asks to see this document. However, the authorities require you to attain this 7-day tourist visa if you walk across the border. If you are staying longer than seven days, you must obtain a 180-tourist visa.

- Have Passport or Passport Card Ready
- If you have minors traveling without parents who will need to notarize a travel Letter of Consent to Travel in case of emergency. A copy is included in this packet.



### **Temporary Importation of Items**

If your group is large and is planning on bringing more personal items than suggested on the What to Bring list, then Baja Christian Ministries may be able to help you file a temporary import permit with Mexico Customs. Depending on the border agent's interpretation of the Mexican customs laws, they may charge you 16% on certain items. You need to provide Baja Christian Ministries with a list of these items at least one week in advance of your border entry:

- # people and days staying in Mexico
- What will your team be doing in Mexico to justify the temporary importation
- Manifest of what your team is bringing into Mexico and the intended purpose for the trip
- Manifest of the vehicles your team will bring into Mexico (Vehicle Info and Driver License)

### Things to Remember while in Mexico

- Stay within your caravans unless you are very familiar with where you are.
- IF YOU GET SEPARATED from the group, pull over at the first opportunity, DO NOT turn onto a different street. Someone will come back for you. Do not assume that you know where they went.
- Please avoid straying from the group unless you have arranged with our staff or your group leaders to leave for evangelizing, shopping, or other essential activities.
- Kindly heed any instructions provided by BCM team members. Their guidance is solely for your safety and to enhance the quality of your trip.
- Upon arrival at the worksite, park all vehicles as close to the site as feasible. Ensure that all doors are
  securely locked, windows closed, and valuables concealed. If your group is large or has numerous
  vehicles, or if close parking isn't feasible, we strongly advise implementing the buddy system, where
  two individuals take turns monitoring the vehicles in one-hour shifts. Please bear in mind that items
  such as backpacks, cameras, purses, and tools are highly appealing to potential thieves.
- Kindly refrain from allowing local children to play in your vehicles, whether with your kids or yourselves. Allowing them access can tempt them and potentially lead to break-ins, as it gives them insight into the contents.
- Mission House/Hotels Things to Remember
  - Avoid consuming water from any faucets, including while showering or brushing your teeth. Use bottled water.
  - Dispose of all toilet paper in the trash rather than the toilet. This applies to most establishments, including restaurants, stores, and any other places you may visit.

### Crossing back into the United States

- Ensure you have all passports readily accessible and not stored in a bag tucked away.
- Remember, bringing meats, nuts, fruits, and vegetables back into the United States is prohibited. This
  list is subject to weekly changes. We suggest consuming or giving away these items to the family
  you've assisted.
- Declare any purchases made while in Mexico. For more information, visit the Clearing USA Customs link provided.

#### Payments to BCM

Baja Christian Ministries California operates as a 501c3 nonprofit. We will provide an invoice outlining
the expected costs for all projects. It's important to note that circumstances may sometimes lead to
changes in these costs. However, we make every effort to maintain consistent project costs throughout
the year and provide advance notice of any significant changes whenever possible. All overnight facility



expenses will be managed through BCM via an invoice. Please be aware that BCM does not own the facilities your team utilizes.

### **Team Coordination/Extension Guide**

Your group will have a BCM coordinator to manage trip logistics. In Mexico, BCM team members will assist with construction and navigation, but we cannot guarantee constant availability. If your team requires additional guidance, an extension guide may be provided for an extra fee.

### **Communication while in Mexico**

Ensure at least two team members have roaming packages for reliable cell service in Mexico. This enables constant communication with the BCM team and effective navigation using Google Maps and Waze.

### **Letter of Consent to Travel**

Minors are not allowed in Mexico, by law, without a parent or a legal guardian. As a group leader, you become the guardian of all minors in your group, making you legally responsible for their actions. Mexican Law requires the Letter of Consent to Travel and must be notarized before arrival and carried for the entire stay in Mexico.



# **Letter of Consent to Travel**

Minors are not allowed in Mexico, <u>by law</u>, without a parent or a legal guardian. As a group leader, you become the guardian of all minors in your group, making you legally responsible for their actions. *Mexican Law requires the Letter of Consent to Travel* must be notarized before arrival and carried for the entire duration of stay in Mexico.
